Dear Planning Partners,

The Sahtú Land Use Planning Board ("SLUPB") is happy to release its second annual monitoring report on the implementation of the Sahtú Land Use Plan ("Plan"). It deals with the way the Plan has been implemented by Regulators by monitoring the authorizations/ dispositions they issued between April 1st, 2021, and March 31st, 2022. In addition to this, a new requirement was implemented this year, which required Regulators to report on how they considered the Plan's Conformity Requirements. These are the rules that must be followed by land use activities requiring an authorization/disposition issued by a Regulator. This is an important step into understanding how the Plan is being implemented, and continue work with Regulators to make sure that it is understood. The ultimate goal is to evaluate how the Plan's clarity can be improved to better achieve the guiding principles of the Plan, as set out in the Sahtu Dene and Metis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement (SDMCLCA).

The Plan is a document that outlines what land uses are allowed, where they are allowed, and under what conditions. Its primary purpose is to protect and promote the well-being of the people and communities in the Sahtú Settlement Area. The Plan's goals focus on sustaining ecological and cultural integrity, increasing community capacity and decisionmaking about land and resource management, and increasing economic self-sufficiency through sustainable development. The Plan is implemented by a range of governments and organizations that approve land uses in the Sahtú Settlement Area. These are the Regulators that reported on the land use activities requiring an authorization/disposition, as presented in this report.

We hope that this document provides a useful overview for all Planning Partners as a means to understand how the Plan is being implemented by Regulators. We will be publishing yearly reports followed by a detailed review and evaluation after several years of monitoring. Another component the SLUPB will be looking at in the coming years is its Stream 2 monitoring, which will evaluate how the Plan's vision and goals are being achieved.

The SLUPB would like to thank all of the Regulators who shared information for this year's monitoring report, and we look forward to continuing working with Regulators on improving the Plan's understanding and develop solutions that better enable its implementation. This collaborative work also helps SLUPB staff understand the challenges faced by Regulators, assisting them in improving their own internal processes. We recommend readers to visit the SLUPB's website at www.sahtulanduseplan.org, where you will find a variety of other resources that support the Plan. Our staff people and Board Members are also happy to answer questions and listen to your input. By contributing to SLUPB activities, together we all can improve the implementation of the Plan.



STREAM 2


monitoring focuses on:

SLUP ZONE(S) & TYPE (adapted from S.3.2 of the Sahtú Land Use Plan)

Special Management Zone (SMZ) Proposed Conservation Initiative (PCI) General Use Zones (GUZ) Conservation Zone (CZ) Established Protected Area (EPA)

Special Management Zones (SMZ) allow all types of land use other than bulk water removal, subject to the general CRs and applicable special management CRs outlined in the Plan. Special management CRs may differ between special management zones; some are limited in application to specified zones.

Conservation Zones (CZ) are significant traditional, cultural, heritage and ecological areas in which specified land uses are prohibited. Permitted land uses (anything not prohibited, or grandfathered uses) are subject to the general CRs and applicable special management CRs outlined in the Plan.

Proposed Conservation Initiatives (PCI) are areas for which formal legislated protection is being sought through the Protected Areas Strategy, pursuant to commitments under the *SDMCLCA*, or under Parks Canada's legislation. The establishment of a protected area is the intended use of PCIs and is permitted. PCIs have the same status as Conservation Zones in the Plan until they are protected under other legislation.

Established Protected Areas (EPA) is the designation given to all legislated protected areas once they are fully established. Once an area is designated as an Established Protected Area, the Plan no longer provides direction to these areas. Instead, they are managed according to their sponsoring legislation and management plans (where applicable). As such, EPAs are treated separately than the four zone types in the rest of the Plan.

<u>General Use Zones</u> (GUZ) allow all land use except bulk water removal, subject to the general CRs outlined in the Plan.

PROGRESS TOWARD ACTIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

The Sahtú Land Use Plan contains Actions and Recommendations that are intended to guide the Sahtú Land Use Planning Board, applicants, and regulators responsible for implementing the Sahtú Land Use Plan. The SLUP states, "approving Parties agree to make reasonable efforts to complete all Actions pertaining to them." Recommendations are advisory in nature: the parties have been asked to "consider and implement recommendations wherever feasible and appropriate" (SLUP, p. 49).

The Sahtú Land Use Planning Board and regulators made some progress towards the Actions and Recommendations during the 2021/22 reporting period. However, many Regulators have not issued any authorizations or dispositions, while others have only issued a few. With that in mind, there have not been enough authorizations or dispositions for many Regulators to adequately evaluate their progress on implementing Actions and Recommendations from the SLUP. This may be in part due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which affected the region during the 2021/22 reporting period. During this time, due to travel related restrictions and uncertainties around the pandemic, activities were curtailed in the region. Reporting on the progress of Actions and Recommendations follows, as provided by the indicated organizations.



ACTION #1: Sahtú Land Use Working Group

Responsibility: Sahtú Land Use Planning Board

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

- 1. "The SLUPB will make reasonable efforts to establish and lead a Sahtu Land Use Working Group as a collaborative forum through which to discuss, study and resolve key regional land use issues, and Plan implementation issues.
- 2. The SLUPB will chair the Working Group, which will consist of equal representation from Sahtu aboriginal organizations, and from government, regulators, industry and environmental organizations. Other participants may be invited from time to time to participate as resource people. Quorum requirements will be set to ensure adequate involvement of aboriginal organizations and government in all meetings.
- 3. The SLUPB will hold Working Group meetings as needed, in person or via teleconference to advance key planning issues and identify solutions for consideration in future Plan amendments.
- 4. The Working Group members will collaboratively set priorities, develop annual workplans, and identify sources of funding as needed to advance this work."



SAHTÚ LAND USE PLANNING BOARD (SLUPB) PROGRESS REPORT:

In the Plan Development stage of the SLUP, there was interest in forming a formal Working Group led by the SLUPB. The original intent of the Working Group was to allow for better communication and coordination between communities and organizations involved in land use in the region, improve relationships, gain access to relevant information, and provide for adaptive learning and management within the Sahtú Settlement Area. There was one attempt by the SLUPB to establish this formal Working Group in 2017 with little response. Because of this and limited funding, no further action was taken. Since then, the SLUPB has adopted a more informal approach to working with the Approving Parties, Designated Sahtú Organizations, and other Planning Partners based on the issues currently facing the SLUPB.

Moving forward, the SLUPB's plans to develop a more targeted and strategic approach for the Working Group. Working in close collaboration with its Planning Partners, it may convene targeted Working Groups to resolve specific issues. While it has not formed a Working Group during





the 2021/22 reporting period due to other activities, such as finalizing Amendments to the Plan and assisting Approving Parties with their approvals, discussion will be required with Planning Partners in the following years to inform the next 5-Year Review Amendments to the Plan. These can be for discussions around emerging topics of concern, such as how the SLUP will deal with climate change, which was repeatedly mentioned in community engagement sessions as a concern to residents of the Sahtú Settlement Area. This topic, along with those identified through Plan development prior to 2013, will be reviewed on an ongoing basis by the Board. These will be addressed in future years based on the current priorities of the SLUPB, Approving Parties, Designated Sahtú Organizations, and Planning Partners. The SLUPB will continue to monitor and solicit input from these organizations and the broader community to be current on emerging topics, and how these can be addressed by a Working Group and the Plan.



ACTION #2: Inspection and Enforcement Priorities

Responsibility: Government departments and other agencies

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

"All government departments and agencies and other bodies having monitoring and enforcement responsibilities will make reasonable efforts to consider the zone designation in setting their inspection and enforcement priorities, recognizing that Conservation Zones, Proposed Conservation Initiatives and Special Management Zones have been identified as sensitive areas requiring a higher level of care."

CANADA ENERGY REGULATOR (CER) PROGRESS REPORT:

The CER has not received any applications or conducted any enforcement activities that are captured under the Sahtú Land Use Plan in the 2021-22 fiscal year. All of the activities conducted in the Sahtú region were in relation to the Imperial Oil Norman Wells Operations which are exempt from the Sahtú Land Use Plan.



ACTION #3: Access to Wildlife Information


Responsibility: Wildlife managers

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

"Wildlife managers (ENR, CWS, PCA, SRRB and DFO) will make reasonable efforts to share, as circumstances require, current available data on important and critical wildlife habitat for fish, furbearers, waterfowl, raptors, barren-ground caribou, mountain and boreal woodland caribou, moose, muskox, mountain goats, Dall's sheep, grizzly bears and black bears. Data will be provided subject to laws of general application regarding privacy and access to information."

DFO (CANADA) PROGRESS REPORT:

DFO Science has been working on projects on Great Bear Lake with Déline community members, the SRRB and Cumulative Impact Monitoring Program. The projects involve the collection of information on: fish and fish habitat at depth; water quality information; and information on organisms at lower trophic levels that could be food for fish. This information has been shared with communities and the Sahtú Renewable Resource Board (SRRB) through plain language documents, community meetings and other online resources.



ACTION #4: Water Withdrawals

Responsibility: DFO, GNWT-ENR, SLWB

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

"DFO, GNWT-ENR, and the SLWB will make reasonable efforts to work with communities as requested to discuss community concerns related to water withdrawal, DFO's winter water withdrawal protocol, and alternative solutions to water withdrawal related to specific projects."

SAHTÚ LAND & WATER BOARD PROGRESS REPORT:

CR # 5 - Watershed Management - MGM applied to withdraw water from previously permitted water sources, one of which is Lac Belot which is a CZ in the SLUP with water withdrawal restrictions. Although CR#19 is not directly applicable to Projects in GUZ, Board supported a recommendation that water withdrawal from Lac Belot be prohibited, unless absolutely necessary.

DFO (CANADA) PROGRESS REPORT:

DFO's winter water withdrawal protocol is in effect but does not require an applicant to submit a request for authorization for water withdrawals within the protocol.

GNWT-ENR PROGRESS REPORT: No progress report provided.



RECOMMENDATION #1: Air Quality

Responsibility: ENR

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

- 1. "ENR is encouraged to provide interested parties with a paper copy of the Annual Air Quality Report, and direct them to ENR's Air Quality Programs Coordinator as necessary.
- 2. ENR is encouraged to continue to study the feasibility and advisability of expanding the air quality monitoring network in the NWT. This will be based primarily on industrial development, population growth, and available resources.
- 3. ENR is encouraged to continue to develop air quality related regulations, guidelines and/or standards, as appropriate, for application within territorial jurisdiction through the NWT Environmental Protection Act.
- 4. Regulators are encouraged to recommend to those applying for permits, licences or other authorizations that they conduct all activities in the SSA in conformity with the standards set out in the GNWT's Guidelines for Ambient Air Quality Standards, and other applicable federal or territorial regulations, guidelines or standards as they are developed."

No progress was reported on this recommendation in the 2021/22 fiscal year.



RECOMMENDATION #2: Climate Change

Responsibility: Applicants and regulators

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

"Applicants and regulators are encouraged to integrate an analysis of the effects of climate change into proposed land use activities, including structures and operations. These effects should be accommodated in the design, operation, and closure and reclamation of the proposed activities. Throughout the planning, development, and management phases, applicants and regulators are also encouraged to assess, report, and monitor how proposed activities contribute to climate change and take steps to minimize such effects."

SAHTÚ LAND & WATER BOARD PROGRESS REPORT:

When oil and gas exploration was being conducted in the Colville Lake area in 2001 to 2003, it was common practice to dispose of drill waste into sumps on the land with the intended result that the materials would be permanently encased in the permafrost. However, as the years have progressed, the Board has seen more evidence that the use of remote sumps in permafrost terrain is not achievable for the majority of cases. This problem will continue as climate change increases the melting of permafrost and recolonization of disturbed areas by different species. The Board included conditions in the Licence S19L1-003 that requires MGM to undertake a risk assessment of three oil and gas sumps (P-27, C49-M17, K14) that have demonstrated ongoing instability and exceedances of contaminants within the permafrost despite 8 years of active remediation efforts; and a condition in the Permit S19A-004 that requires MGM is to develop a Sump Remediation and Restoration






Plan in consultation with all potentially affected parties, especially in Colville Lake. The Board expressed their preference that MGM remove and dispose of all contaminated sump materials off-site to reduce the longterm liability of contaminant migration to the surrounding environment.

DFO (CANADA) PROGRESS REPORT:

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) conducts aquatic climate change science. This ongoing research and monitoring, together with Indigenous knowledge, builds an understanding of the impacts of climate change. DFO's Departmental Sustainable Development Strategy Report summarizes DFO's progress and actions towards the Federal Sustainable Development Strategy goals of greening government; effective action on climate change; healthy coasts and oceans; pristine lakes and rivers; healthy wildlife populations; sustainable food; and safe and healthy communities. TRANSPORT CANADA PROGRESS REPORT:

No applications for Canadian Navigable Water Act approvals were submitted in the Sahtú Settlement Area during the 2021/22 Fiscal Year. As such, no work was done for this recommendation.



GNWT LANDS SURFACE TENURE PROGRESS REPORT:

Not applicable, as we have only processed one application for a surface lease (disposition).

CANADIAN NUCLEAR SAFETY COMMISSION PROGRESS REPORT:

There have been no changes to the CNSC's Waste Nuclear Substance Licence for Port Radium Decommissioned Mine in 2021. In addition there have been no new licence applications to the CNSC within the Sahtú region.

GNWT-ECE PROGRESS REPORT:

Nothing to report.

MINING RECORDERS OFFICE PROGRESS REPORT:

The Mining Recorder's Office does not regulate land use activities or improvements on the land. The MRO issues subsurface mineral tenure only and does not have further requirements for management of the land or proposed activities on the land. Any reporting requirements are based on exploration work, but do not relate directly to land use activities that are legislated by other bodies.

ITI TOURISM (GNWT) PROGRESS REPORT:

Recommending different funding sources to address issues of climate change that affect tourism businesses.





RECOMMENDATION #3: Community Land Use Monitors

Responsibility: Applicants

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

"Where deemed necessary by the community, Applicants are encouraged to fund the local Renewable Resources Council (RRC) to hire an independent, qualified community land use monitor, and support the monitor. In the case of small-scale activities where little to no environmental impact is expected, applicants are encouraged to employ a community research assistant instead."

The SLUPB had scheduled talks with the communities to understand how this recommendation is being implemented. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns, the Sahtú community tour was cancelled and postponed to a later date. The SLUPB hopes to have more information in the following reporting period regarding how this recommendation is being implemented after talking with community organizations throughout the Sahtú Settlement Area.





RECOMMENDATION #4: Incidental Harvest

Responsibility: Applicants

SAHTU LAND USE PLAN - EXCERPT:

"Applicants are encouraged to avoid waste of usable resources and share any incidental harvest with nearby communities."

The SLUPB had scheduled talks with the communities to understand how this recommendation is being implemented. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns, the Sahtú community tour was cancelled and postponed to a later date. The SLUPB hopes to have more information in the following reporting period regarding how this recommendation is being implemented after talking with community organizations throughout the Sahtú Settlement Area.





NEXT STEPS

While this is the second year that the Sahtú Land Use Planning Board ("SLUPB") has required Regulators to report on the received applications for authorizations/dispositions that implement the Plan, it is the first year that they reported on how these applications for authorizations or dispositions addressed the Plan's Conformity Requirements. The intent of this exercise is to understand how Regulators are implementing the Plan, and to identify any problems with interpretation of the Plan's Conformity Requirements. In cases that there are problems with interpretation, the SLUPB will work with Regulators to address these problems by understanding gaps in knowledge and understanding, provide information to help with interpretation, and see whether there is any need to clarify any part of the Plan through the next 5-Year Review. Furthermore, we also expect to streamline the reporting tools and processes over time through feedback from Regulators and lessons learned in collecting and managing the information received from Regulators.

The SLUPB also hopes to work with the District Land Corporations/Self-Governments to better understand the process of how they deal with authorizations on private settlement lands in areas where the Plan applies (e.g. lands outside community boundaries). While settlement lands are private, the Plan also applies to them and consideration for its Conformity Requirements is warranted. Even though the SLUPB anticipates that there have not been many land use applications on private lands outside communities in the past few years (if any at all), awareness of the Plan needs to be addressed. The SLUPB's staff will be starting these discussions with the above-mentioned entities in the coming years, at times when it will be possible to meet in-person. This will be coordinated with other activities planned by the SLUPB in communities of the Sahtú Settlement Area. While our initial work has focused on Stream 1 monitoring, work on Stream 2 monitoring will also commence in the coming years. This includes a review of the outcomes of implementation of the Plan, and considerations to what degree the Plan has helped advance its vision and goals for the region. Our staff will continue to compile and publish monitoring results each year, giving insight that will help us lead discussions for the next 5-Year Review of the Plan. Such discussions will revolve around evaluating decision-making process to see how the Plan is being applied, identify where adjustments, clarification, or changes to the Plan are needed to better meet its goals of protecting and promoting the social, cultural, and economic well-being of the people and communities in the Sahtú Settlement Area.
